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

Background

- ➤ 851,685 people according the Law of Ukraine have the Status of War Veterans
- The largest number of veterans of the Russian-Ukrainian war belong to the age group of 31-40 years old (43.5%)
- > The share of women among veterans is about 9%
- ➤ There will be at least 4 million citizens who will be related to the veteran sphere



Background

According to official registers (on November 19, 2023) the Commission on establishing the fact of captivity announced:

- ➤ 4337 persons (3574 militaries and 763 civilians) were found to be deprived of liberty
- Out of these, 1953 individuals were released from captivity
- ➤ The 4337 people also include persons who have been or continue to be held by the Russian Federation since 2014



GOAL

The goal of the project is to establish a sustainable care system for combat veterans, especially those with a "Prisoner of War" experience.

The primary objective is to implementation of the peer-to-peer principle in the system of care as a component of a comprehensive system of care (prevention, treatment, recovery support) for the veterans in Ukraine.

The expected outcome is a capable workforce addressing post-war trauma challenges, contributing to Ukraine's national care system.





- 1. International Cooperation: Exchange of experience and transfer of best practices with other countries with similar problems (+)
- 2. Adapting Legislation and Policy: Developing and implementing legislation and policy to support veterans and provide them with appropriate protections and opportunities (+; -)
- **3. Networking and Collaboration:** Promote the creation of a network of organizations working with veterans to share experiences, resources, and coordinate efforts (+; -)
- 4. Community and Veteran Engagement: Including veterans in the development and implementation of programs and initiatives that support them, and mobilizing public support and understanding of veterans' issues (-; +)
- 5. Legal Advocacy and Rights: Ensuring that the rights of veterans and their families are protected, including access to legal assistance and fighting for social and economic rights (-; +)



Key Principles of System Change for ITTC Ukraine

- 1. Adaptability: The current environment is rapidly changing, so it is important to remain flexible and adaptable in our approach
- 2. Experimentation: The System Change Model is currently theoretical for Ukrainian team, requiring experimentation to evaluate its usefulness for ITTC Ukraine
- 3. Influence Assessment: A crucial part of our work at ITTC Ukraine is assessing which parts of the system we can influence
