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


Global Drug Demand Reduction Programs

- **Drug prevention and treatment are a key component of U.S. international counterdrug policy.**
- **Training programs in treatment & prevention, as well as specialized programs for treatment of women, children, and people in rural communities have been developed** with input from the scientific community and international organizations such as the Colombo Plan and the UN Office on Drugs and Crime.
- **ICUDDR is a very important initiative drawing on the talents and resources of the top experts and institutions essential to making progress on substance use disorders.**


